

Reading the Litany fulfills one of the conditions for earning indulgence. The Litany also reminds us of the character of St. Joseph and why Lenten season is an ideal time to learn how to grow in devotion to him. As in other areas of Christian life, St. Joseph is a great example of Lenten virtues, says Fr. That Son.

Francis chose to provide for plenary indulgence through St. Joseph upon deep reflection of the world's current condition, especially during pandemic. St. Joseph remains an example of faith, selflessness, fatherhood, and family devotion. He is a key intercessor in modern times and provides an opportunity for

Pope Establishes World Day of Grandparents

Pope Francis has established a World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly as a reminder of the important role they play as a link between generations. The news came during Francis' Sunday Angelus address Jan. 31.

"Their voice is precious because it sings the praises of God and safeguards the roots of peoples," he said.

The annual celebration will occur on the fourth Sunday of July to coincide with the feast of Sts. Joachim and Anne, Jesus' grandparents. July 25 will mark the first celebration. Catherine Wiley, founder of the Catholic Grandparents Association, said the organization has been at the forefront of campaigning for greater care and recognition of grandparents and is thankful this day has come.

"(The Holy Father) has a great love of grandparents and the elderly. We look forward to being part of this new annual celebration as the charisms of grandparents and the elderly are brought to the fore and passed on to the next generation."

DISTRIBUTION OF ASHES WILL

be different this year because of pandemic. Here is what to expect:

- * Father will say the prayer blessing the ashes.
- * He will sprinkle the ashes with holy water, without speaking.
- * He then will address all those present and only once say the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general:
 - "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."
- * He next will cleanse his hands, put on a face mask, and distribute ashes by sprinkling them on the heads of each person, without speaking.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM:

By appointment. The diocese requires instructions beforehand for parents or guardians. Contact the parish office.


