

GOSPEL MEDITATION

When I was a kid, I remember the priest at Mass announcing, "The Lamb of God!" Frankly, it struck me as nonsense. I thought: Why in the world does God have a lamb? And where is this lamb?

John the Baptist sees Jesus coming toward him and announces, "Behold the lamb of God." His Jewish listeners knew what he meant. God's lamb is the thing make us free. This is what we do at every Mass. that is sacrificed at the Jewish Passover and consumed by the participants. For almost a thousand years, lambs were ritually slaughtered and eaten in Jerusalem at Passover. The lamb meant sacrifice, freedom from sin, and communion with God. The

Baptist is saying in effect, "This man will be ritually sacrificed and consumed so that God's people may be free from sin and united to God."

It's crucial to relate to Jesus as a friend, brother, teacher, and Lord of our lives. But we should also learn to interact with Him as our lamb of God. That means we intentionally place on him our sins, sadnesses, and hopes, and offer him to God. Then we consume him to That's why he is the Lamb of God.

Funcation Opportunities

Ecclesiastes 7:12

For the protection of wisdom is like the protection of money, and the advantage of knowledge is that wisdom preserves the life of him who has it.

Even way, way, way back in time (around 300 BC) Ecclesiastes discerned the advantages of acquiring knowledge and concluded that wisdom protects and preserves the lives of those who possess it. As we begin this new year, our parish invites, encourages, implores us to spread THE good news (evangelization): to take up the challenge of imparting knowledge (and its offspring, wisdom) in all the ways we are able.

One specific way we can do this is by supporting a newly formed scholarship program for parish youth. The details are still being ironed out – but here are some of the ideas being discussed:

Eligibility:- The recipient/s will be a child or dependent of a registered parishioner

Requirements: The successful applicant will:

- ⇒ attend or be accepted into a 4 year accredited Catholic university or institution of higher education
- ⇒ be entering as a freshman or sophomore in 2023
- ⇒ have a high school GPA of 3.0 or higher
- ⇒ complete an application with a deadline as yet to be determined. The application will be competitive with much weight given to participation in parish life.
