

Willing to put in a good measure of effort, we desire positive results. When life gets hurtful, unjust, and downright ugly, we become unsettled and can quickly fall into despair. We all carry within us the image of God—the image of our suffering king. 

Churches Highlight of Journey



We promised to share when we could Fr. That Son's photographs of the Seven Churches of Revelation from the part of his recent pilgrimage that included Turkey. The eve of Advent seems a good time to consider the churches. The Apostle John wrote letters to these churches while he was exiled at Patmos for practicing Christianity. John received prophetic visions from Christ instructing him to write what he saw and send it to the churches. Father said he felt most blessed to visit all the churches, some of which involved steep climbs to reach. He also was moved to witness the archaeology that proves the churches existed and to consider at the sites the messages written to the congregations.

Ephesus was a major Roman city of eclectic cultures and influences. Withstanding false prophets was the warning for them.

5. Sardis

Sardis was seen as spiritually dead for compromising beliefs to survive hardships. Alive outside but dead within was their rebuke. They were told to repent before all was lost.



2. Smyrna

Smyrna was a rich and important seaport, so persecution came in the form of financial hardship. Congregants were told to hold fast to spiritual wealth.

Philadelphia won praise alone for keeping the faith. A strong synagogue community hostile to Christians did not deter them. They were small, which limited their strength, but an open-door policy prevailed.

3. Pergamos

Pergamos was seen as Satan's throne, likely because Zeus' Temple was there. Congregants were told to repent or face wrath from John.



4. Thyatira

Thyatira was a city of artisans and many guilds, but it also was home to Jezebel, who led many cults. Her followers would be struck dead, they were assured.



7. Laodicea

Laodicea was scolded for allowing economic prosperity to cause spiritual bankruptcy. It is written that Jesus would "spit out" the congregation if they did not repent for being spiritually lukewarm. Only those who opened the door to Christ's wealth would share in His spiritual banquet.
