

GOSPEL MEDITATION: ENCOURAGING DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

My friend and fellow pastor, Father Paul, noticed unsightly, overgrown trees near his parish church. He asked the maintenance crew to cut back the growth, which they happily did, telling him the trees would be much healthier and even fuller after a good pruning. A few days later, Father Paul received a letter from an irate man in the neighborhood who wrote, "Jesus would never prune trees like that. He loves trees, unlike you."

I suspect that the neighbor was not familiar with this week's Gospel in which Jesus says of his Father, "He removes every

branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit" (John 15:2) I don't mean to pick too much on that fellow. He was perhaps ignorant of arboriculture. But I'd wager his main confusion was the pruning and removing quality of God's love. That confusion afflicts us all to some degree, doesn't it? It is just so darn easy to react negatively when God cuts something out of our lives and assume it's not his work at all. In the moment, all we see is the loss, and not the loving desire for future flourishing.

The cross is the great pruning of Christ's body. Jesus' rising is the brand-new growth. It is God's promise to us that all the painful pruning in life is leading us somewhere beautiful. What has been cut back or out in your life? A friend, an opportunity, a sense of certainty, a job, health, a relationship? This week, offer those dry branches to the one who lovingly prunes us in order to make our lives burst with verdant growth.

MOTHERS DAY IS SUNDAY, MAY 12.

DID YOU KNOW: Mother's Day was founded by Anna Jarvis from Grafton, WV. Anna's mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, taught Sunday school at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton for a quarter of a century. In 1876,

when Anna was 12 years old, her mother taught a school lesson on "Mothers of the Bible," ending the lesson with a prayer calling for the establishment of a day to celebrate mothers.

Daughter Anna said, "This heart-rending, agonizing prayer burned its way into my mind and heart so deeply, and it never ceased to burn. I could never forget it."

Mrs. Jarvis died May 9, 1905. On her mother's grave, daughter Anna pledged to honor her mother's final wish stating, "The time and place is here and the someone is your daughter, and by the grace of God, you shall have a Mother's Day."

On May 10, 1908, the sleepy coal town of Grafton, WV celebrated the first Mother's Day and it didn't take long for others to catch on. President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Mother's Day the second Sunday of May in 1914. The International Mother's Day Shrine is located in historic downtown Grafton, and is one of only 16 National Historic Landmarks in West Virginia. The special day honoring mothers is now celebrated around the globe.

You can celebrate the leading mothers in your life by giving them a spiritual bouquet card. Cards are available in the vestibule and in the church office. Mothers will be honored in a special way at Mass on Mother's Day.


