The boiler is still working, but we face new challenges each year. Last month after another repair we asked for a replacement proposal. The price tag is steep—\$64,400 for a high efficiency unit—but everyone agrees, meaning our church finance council, the diocesan office of building and property, and Bishop Brennan: The boiler needs replaced.

Ordering now locks in the price until parts are available and before costs increase a projected minimum of 20 percent next year. The order is in.
