GOSPEL MEDITATION: THE PURSUIT OF JOY

Did you ever stop and realize that there is no earthly gain that can ever really satisfy us? Imagine winning the Lotto. On the “what if” side of the ticket, it’s all about the money and fantasies of how we will spend it. The possibility of acquiring these things brings us back again and again to purchase the next week’s ticket. Then one day we win! Our dreams are fulfilled, and happiness is on the horizon. We wrap ourselves in our newfound friendship with riches. We cast aside what brought us struggle and worry. Our challenges subside.

Then another day comes--the day we realize nothing remarkable. Nothing left to want or to inspire us. We come to understand that earthly gains cannot sustain us, and the joy we thought we attained was only novelty.

Glimpses of true joy are possible but not by material means. They are brought to us through incredible experiences of connection that bring us face to face with real and authentic faith, hope, and love. They are glimpses that are fleeting. The moment we find ourselves looking back at them, we realize their gift. To carry joy within us is to realize that it is not something we create, manufacture or even acquire. It cannot be purchased. It is a gift. The need for joy mirrors the need for eternity, for a Creator who has a claim on the very essence of who we are and desires a home within each of us.

As C. S. Lewis discovered, joy is a surprise that speaks to the very soul and is given as a gift by the God, who loves us.

The beauty of Advent is found in discovering the beauty of the gift of joy. God has visited his people for no other reason than to show them where and how to find joy! All of our human and earthly joy experiences are always only glimpses, and it is only God who is the joy of our souls. Real, Divine experiences of joy catch us off guard, make us stop and become aware, bring a feeling of awe and rightness and have an eternal Otherness about them.

Nothing created by humans can ever come close to this experience.

Wedding Story Recalls Bygone Traditions

What was my wedding like 60 years ago in 1960?

I was 19 and my groom was 22. Together we earned \$4 an hour.

The invitations were mailed one month prior to the SFX noon wedding scheduled the Saturday after Thanksgiving with Fr. Hopkins officiating.

Marrying a non-Catholic was considered a mixed marriage and did not qualify for a Nuptial Mass, so the wedding occurred off the altar on the parishioner side of the communion rail. Music was performed by Millie Fromhart, the longtime parish organist.

No attendant rented special clothes. The males wore suits and the females wore their prom gowns with their shoulders covered by added, very wide, cape-like straps. The maid of honor and best man needed to be Catholics, which restricted my groom's choices but solved the problem of my choosing one of two best friends. After a short ceremony, the "kiss the bride" moment happened outside on the church steps under a shower of rice.

Jenny's only wedding photograph is this proof made by the Wheeling News-Register. It was customary at that time for newspapers to take announcement photos.

The reception followed at the VFW Hall. Pete Bieniek and the Polka Dots, a trio of a trumpet, drums, and accordion, played some music that pleased both my immigrated grandmother and my Lithuanian-born God mother.

The buffet, including golumbki (cabbage rolls), was provided by family members, the cake was bought at Quality Bakery, and the open bar was stocked by both fathers.

One Polish tradition observed was a short dance with the bride, costing a small money donation that was thanked with a shot glass of choice "liquid."

During the band's last song, guests circled me as my mother removed my bridal veil and replaced it with an apron to start my homemaking for the next 60 years. -- Jenny Rejonis Ingram
