

GOSPEL MEDITATION: ALLOW GOD TO FIND YOU

In Blaise Pascal's work, Pensees, he says: "What else does this craving, and this helplessness, proclaim but that there was once in man a true happiness, of which all that now remains is the empty print and trace? This he tries in vain to fill with everything around him, seeking in things that are not there the help he cannot find in those that are, though none can help, since this infinite abyss can be filled only with an infinite and immutable object; in other words by God himself."

We have a difficult time accepting that fulfillment and happiness are not achieved by our own merits but through a relationship with God. We come from God and are designed to return to God. The world does not realize that it is waiting. It is waiting for

the birth of God in time, within one's soul and in eternity. We get so confused by seeking other momentary satisfactions that we misinterpret the hunger within. We crave God.

The union of God and humanity, revealed in Jesus Christ, is precisely what sets us on a straight path, orders our relationships, establishes proper focus and goals and tells us whose kingdom we really are meant to serve. We are so lost. God is with us. The prophet Nathan told this to King David, the angel said this to Mary and the birth of Christ brings this Good News to us. We do not need to be busily looking for more things but must learn to find contentment and blessing in the One Presence. This is the beautiful simple message of Advent!

If you are feeling unsettled, anxious, angry, disgruntled, disconnected, unhappy, worried, fearful, off center, becoming overly self-indulgent, unable to spend time alone and without distraction, then there's a good chance you are lost. Now is the time to allow God to find you! Ponder the holy simplicity of Mary's call to be the Mother of God. "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word."

When we are helpless and at home with our emptiness, God will fill us. Our Savior has come.

MEN FOR OTHERS

Honoring Our Own During St. Joseph's Year

oseph was a man for others. Though the Scriptures say little about Joseph, even that absence speaks volumes, Why? Because to Joseph, he was not the one who was important, others were.

Joseph's quiet and humble service reminds us of our parish men, whom we wish to recognize during this year of St. Joseph, which Pope Francis recently decreed to honor the saint's 150th anniversary as patron of the Universal Church.

The Year of St. Joseph began Dec. 8, 2020 and concludes Dec. 8, 2021.

Francis established a Year of St. Joseph so that "every member of the faithful, following his example, may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of God's will."

The pope has also granted special indulgences to mark the year. During this period, the faithful will have the opportunity to commit themselves with prayer and good works to obtain, with the help of St. Joseph, head of the heavenly Family of Nazareth, comfort and relief from the serious human and social tribulations that besiege the contemporary world today. In addition to the decree, Francis

issued an apostolic letter dedicated to the foster father of Jesus.

The pope explained in the letter. titled Patris corde ("With a father's heart") and dated Dec. 8, that he wanted to share some "personal reflections" on the spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, who was a humble man of faith who had a close, intimate, and personal relationship with the God of His Fathers. Named after the great Patriarch who was sold into slavery in Egypt, Joseph bore the name with similar humility. "My desire (to share thoughts) increased during these months of pandemic," the pope said, noting that many people had made hidden sacrifices during the crisis in order to protect others.

"Each of us can discover in Joseph -- the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence -- an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble," he wrote. "St. Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation."

We honor our parish men during this Year of St. Joseph as the husbands, fathers, grandfathers, brothers, uncles, cousins, nephews, coaches, mentors, pastors, ministers, and religious whose intercession, support, and sincerity keep our faith community strong. Please remember these men in your prayers.


