GOSPEL MEDITATION: THREE GIFTS AND THE HOLY FAMILY

Tragedy and disappointment are inevitable. What sees you through this? There will be challenges, changes, unexpected circumstances, interrupted plans, hurts, and injustices experienced by every human being at some point in their lives. We will be asked to adjust our plans, change course, and even encounter suffering and death. Where do we learn all of the lessons we need to live life well? Some of them we learn along the way, but much of what we bring to life, positive and negative, comes from our early beginnings, our families. This is our early world and provides the blueprint for how we see the bigger, more inclusive world, which unfolds before us.

Our families of origin can be sources of grace, heartache or a combination of both. Families are intended to be pivotal in providing us with proper social structure and understanding, a support system, lessons about relationships and communication, and the unconditional acceptance and love we so desperately crave. They can also determine whether we have an accessible and healthy relationship with God. Many of life's challenges can literally bring us to our knees and require that we possess a strength of character that resides well beyond the superficialities of our world. At some point we will all need three coping gifts that can be given to us only by God: faith, hope, and love. Our families help us learn that we are not the ones responsible for their creation, but God who provides!

Our experience of early family life colors all of our relationships and what we expect to achieve from life in general. Resolving conflicts, dealing with difficulty and suffering, celebrating accomplishments, prioritizing our needs, listening to God's call, understanding relationships, understanding disappointment, learning about the virtues, and living a centered life are all lessons our families either succeed in teaching or do not. To succeed, as God has designed and ordered our world, is to discover His presence and then trust that presence. The Holy Family can teach even the most dysfunctional family how to best use God's gifts of faith, hope, and love to find Him and do His will. Their simple humble example is always before us, showing us the way. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, pray for us!

Nativity, Novena Highlight Latin Observances

Missionaries Share **Christmas Traditions**

T n Paraguay there is a Christmas tradition in which we set the Nativity Scene in our houses.

We place the figures of the Holy Family, the angel, the star, the shepherds and the Three Kings, and we decorate it with summer fruits, since Christmas in December is summer there. Some people use watermelons, grapes, oranges or pineapples in their decoration; however, in every Nativity Scene there is a coconut flower. This is a three-feet-long flower enjoyed all season which has a very good aroma.

Everybody writes a letter to the Three Kings. At the feast of the Epiphany the Three Kings come to the Nativity scene to visit the baby Jesus. The Kings also give gifts to all those in the house. When I was a child, I wrote them a list of gifts I wanted. Now that I am older I write them letters asking for their intercession. After January Sixth we turn the figures of the Kings around since they have already seen the Savior and should be on their way back. Finally, after the feast of the Lord's Baptism, we remove the Nativity Scene.

he most important Christmas tradition from the part of Brazil that I am from (Sao Paulo) is the Christmas Novena.

Officially by the Church, the Novena begins on the Seventeenth of December. However, we begin it before so throughout the Advent Season we can be preparing ourselves for the celebration of the Incarnation of our Lord. The parishioners usually organize themselves by groups, which sometimes may be quite numerous and sometimes very small. We celebrate the Novena in the houses usually twice a week and up to nine days. It is a very opportune moment to invite a neighbor, a relative, or a friend who was away from the Church. Since it is a celebration which happens in a house, people will be more comfortable coming to a house.

Every day of the Novena is celebrated in a different house. There, the Word of God is proclaimed and there is a moment for reflections and for songs. The familial context of the Novena always creates an environment of expectancy for the Celebration of Christmas and communion among those who attend it. Usually the one who is hosting the celebration will offer some homemade finger food for everyone in the house, and it is truly a feast.

On Christmas Eve, we used to go to Mass in the evening and on the way back wait until midnight, when around the table a banquet was ready, and we would pray, thanking the Lord for his goodness to us. Only after Christmas Mass the kids of the house would put the baby Jesus on the manger.

SURVEY OF CATHOLIC DOCTRINE.
