

Many difficult human experiences can cause us to question the why of things or even fall into despair. Sometimes we even choose asking no questions at all. To question or not to question — that is the question! People sometimes give up the God search because it causes too many questions.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

BLACK Meet Church Leaders of African Descent

As part of Black History Month, we are joining the

call to celebrate six Americans of African descent who are on the road to sainthood. So far, there are no American saints of African descent.



Venerable Pierre Toussaint (1776-1853)

Toussaint came to America a slave and became one of America's first wealthy, black entrepreneurs. He used his wealth to support

the Church and the poor, and he and his wife sheltered in their home orphans, refugees, and the homeless. He founded one of New York's first orphanages and raised money for the city's first cathedral.



Servant of God Mother Mary Elizabeth Lange (1784-1882) Elizabeth led the creation of the Oblate Sisters of

Providence, the first

religious congregation of African American women in the Church. The congregation educated and evangelized African Americans, educated youth, and provided a home for orphans. They also nursed the terminally ill during the cholera epidemic of 1832 and sheltered the elderly.



Venerable Henriette
Delille (1813-1862)
Henriette greatly suffered
throughout her life, but
she practiced heroic
virtue. She taught that

sanctity can be attained in following the path of Jesus. In this manner she dealt with troubles to achieve her goals. God blessed her in the founding of the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family.

Venerable Fr. Augustus Tolton (1854-1897) "Good Father Gus" was the first U.S. Roman Catholic priest publicly known to be black. A former slave who

was baptized and reared Catholic, Tolton formally studied in Rome. He led the creation of St. Monica's Catholic Church as a black "National Parish Church," and his success at ministering to black Catholics quickly earned him national attention within the Catholic hierarchy.



Servant of God Julia Greeley (1833 & 1848-1918) Julia was born into slavery and entered the Church at Sacred Heart Parish in Denver. She was an

outstanding servant to the parish, and the Jesuits there considered her the most enthusiastic promoter of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus they had ever seen. She joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1901 and was active until her death in 1918.



Servant of God Sr. Thea Bowman, FSPA (1937-1990)

Thea converted to Catholicism as a child—inspired by Franciscan

Sisters of Perpetual Adoration and missionary servants who were her teachers and pastors. During her short lifetime, many people considered her a religious sister undeniably close to God who lovingly invited others to encounter Him in their lives. She is acclaimed as a "holy woman" by those who seek her intercession.
