Often, we find ourselves looking at those we have hurt square in the eye and wallowing in our foolishness. We regrettably realize that we have allowed our needs to lure us into making some cruel mistakes. We impulsively say things and flippantly do things that reveal our unredeemed and unhealed self. It is a self we stumble over and try to tame but can't quite seem to master and control. Help!

We spin our wheels, naively thinking that we will somehow, perhaps through persistence, get ourselves unstuck. But, we don't. We just get out of the car, feeling very helpless, and ignorantly look at the mess we got ourselves

into. Did we ever think to ask someone for help? Or, taken the advice of One who is wiser and avoid this route altogether? "Come after me," are words that Jesus says to all of us. In order to heed his invitation, we must leave our ego-self behind and follow.

When we understand the freedom, peace, justice, and love he offers, we find ourselves with such sorrow in our hearts for how foolish we have been. All the misguided choices and sinful actions come full view and we see how risky our random impassioned behaviors really have been. Repentance is beautiful. When done with a sincere and contrite heart, it directs us to the glory that can be ours, ignites us with the challenge of living a life in service of others and reminds us that all is well. ©LPi

## Forefront Fighters in the Battle Against Poverty Ask: What Would You Do?

If you were in charge of lowering the poverty rate, what would you do? It's an interesting thought experiment, and Catholic Charities of West Virginia wants your opinion. Where should we start? Whatever you can share is welcome here: <u>catholiccharitieswv.salsalabs.org/readerpoll.</u> As you ponder the question, consider the following:

The Catholic Campaign for Human Development (an office of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops) reports that the national poverty rate is 13.1%. In West Virginia, that number is even higher at 17.9%. So that means that almost 18% of West Virginians are struggling with things like:

not enough to eat

inability to afford living expenses

unstable housing

lack of transportation

difficulty working and/or learning

Because these statistics are not theoretical, it is so important to remind ourselves that there are actual faces attached to these vague numbers. During Poverty Awareness Month we need to especially remember that people are our greatest gifts and most valuable assets.

As Catholics and people of goodwill, our eyes are open. We strive to really see our brothers and sisters who are vulnerable. We constantly ask ourselves: "Is poverty acceptable?" Since Jesus has told us poverty is not acceptable, we must next ask the question: "What should we do about it?"

Poverty is a complex issue that society has been trying to solve for centuries. There are many factors at play, and it is incredibly difficult to untangle every aspect. Becoming fully "aware" of its complexity is the first step to deciding what to do about it.

Is there a "silver bullet" solution? Many will say "no' and point out that poverty dates back to ancient times. In the Christian gospel of John, Jesus says to his disciple Judas: "You will always have the poor among you." Yet many others disagree, saying quaranteed income is the targeted solution.

We need to take a next step and truly think about poverty, analyze it, and share those thoughts with those on the front lines of fighting the battle for everyone. Consider taking part in that process in writing to CCWV.
