

### **GOSPEL MEDITATION: LOVE IN THE RIGHT PLACES**

R elationships break down, and sometimes we don't know how to rebuild them. They break down because we decide to walk away when love becomes demanding. But relationships also lose meaning when we decide to stay solely to please someone that we no longer love. We leave without ever knowing what we were looking for to begin with; we turn back empty handed, trapped in our fantasies. Even if we decide to stay, we may struggle to find meaning, and we consume ourselves in bitterness.

Living in rebellion and settling are two temptations that lurk in our hearts. They are signs of an immature love: the capricious love of a child that wants affection without responsibility, and the competitive love of the adolescent that is always conflictive,

rejecting any form of authority. They are two poor forms of loving that persist in our hearts and that are in need of reconciliation. Love is hard work and it requires commitment. One often loses oneself in love. But by inhabiting this loss, we discover God as He who has been looking for us all along. Like the sheep and the coin, even children may become lost. Likewise like the shepherd and the old woman who seek them out, so the Father waits and watches.

Perhaps relationships fall apart because we try to possess love, as if we could own it: give me my share! The prodigal son is like those who find relationships suffocating: they want to love, but without commitment, without constraints. The prodigal son represents those who believe they can only ever be in a relationship of servitude. The

father must show him a true relationship of freedom. The father is who creates paths of reconciliation. Luke describes how the father's love is expressed in profound actions - the new robe is a symbol of restored dignity. (It is the same as God's gesture to Adam and Eve when he makes clothes out of animal skins after they sin and realize they are naked.) The ring bears the stamp that permits him to manage the father's goods. (Despite it all, the father re-entrusts the son with everything that is his.) The sandals are a symbol of the free man. (The slave walks barefoot.)

In a healthy relationship we should never feel condemned to be the servant of the other. The father models the Father, and the feast is the celebration that the son lives --Catholic-Link (excerpted and edited) again.

# Facts, History, and Traditions For St. Joseph's Feast Day

Whether it's called St. Joseph's Day, The Feast of St. Joseph or La Festa di San Giuseppe, March 19 is dedicated to the husband of the Virgin Mary. Enjoy the feast, which usually comes two days after St. Patrick's Day, and some interesting facts from Fisheaters.com and The Times-Picayune.

- \* The altar, also known as "St. Joseph's Table" or "la tavola di San Giuseppe," is an important part of the ceremony. People decorate it with flowers, candles, wine and some "lucky" foods.
- \* Fava beans are supposedly "lucky" since they survived during a draught in Italy during the Middle Ages when nothing else did. St. Joseph, through God, saved worshipers from the draught, some believe.
- \* Lemons are also thought to be good luck on this day. A side fact: If a woman looking to get married steals a lemon from the altar, it will help her find a husband.
- \* Breadcrumbs are usually incorporated into dishes. They represent sawdust, which commemorates Joseph's job as a

# carpenter. They could also represent the dry earth during the draught.

- \* Although it is permitted, meat is sometimes left off the altar since St.
  Joseph's Day takes place during Lent. Celebrants sometimes also feast on fish and other seafood.
- St Joseph's Day is arguably best known for its pastries, with *sfinge* (cream puffs) and *zeppole* (doughnuts) being the most popular. Find the recipes for both here at cookingwithnonna.com/italian-cuisine
- \* It's tradition to wear red like wearing green on St. Patrick's Day.
- \* St. Joseph's Day is largely celebrated in New Orleans, a popular port among 19th century Sicilian immigrants. The French Quarter has even garnered the special nickname "Little Palermo."

## Washing Feet, Kissing of Cross Safety Considered

During this time of pandemic, washing of the feet will be modified and kissing or touching of the cross will be prohibited to ensure safety. Washing of the feet will still be offered on Holy Thursday, but those who wish to participate must bring their own towels and be prepared to dry their own feet.

Also, kissing of the cross will not be permitted as part of the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord on Good Friday.
