

#### GOSPEL MEDITATION: SIMPLY WRITTEN ON OUR HEARTS

Inderstanding that God is in a loving and committed relationship with those fashioned and formed in God's own image seems like such a simple lesson to learn. But history and experience has proven that it is not.

We struggle with faith, especially when that faith asks us to learn something very particular about ourselves. We must, like a grain of wheat, fall to the ground and die. Because God is at the very core of who we are, there are specific pearls of wisdom that must be acquired before we can live a full life. One very powerful lesson is that it is not the task of the world to tell us who we are and what has meaning, but God. For many, death is not an opportunity for

greater life but a permanent ending to the life they have known. Jesus knew every dimension to what it means to be fully human because he was! He knows the joys, limitations, sorrows, frustrations, wonders, suffering, opportunities, and joys of the human experience. Jesus can teach us a wealth of knowledge and life's lessons from his example, especially obedience.

When we accept the law God has placed in our hearts and gain wisdom from it, then when we suffer we learn to listen more attentively to the Voice behind that law. We naturally flee to our Creator for inspiration, consolation, hope, direction, and comfort as we navigate through this

time of darkness. We will not need to run from it, subdue it, fight it, or be overcome by it because we will know, having internalized this profound lesson before, that God will bring new life. God's law is love and love never fails. Even in the moments of Jesus' deepest despair, he glorified the name of his Father. What he learned allowed him to put everything in perspective and be obedient to the tender, loving Voice that echoed within. As Lent quickly winds down, may we learn the same! Then, may we gain the fortitude and wisdom to help others see what is right before their eyes.

# Annunciation of the Lord, Waffles, and Measuring Days

Thanks to a linguistic misunderstanding,

those who enjoy breakfast for dinner may celebrate the feast of the Annunciation of the Lord March 25 with a stack of waffles. Yes, you read that correctly--waffles.

As we Catholics know, solemnities are of the highest rank--so much so that

Lenten penances are set aside when necessary so we can joyously celebrate the associated feasts. To understand the connection between waffles and Our Lady, we must travel to Sweden, where Our Lady Day, or *Vårfrudagen*, is close

in both spelling and pronunciation to *Våffeldagen*, which means "Waffle Day." In fact, if either of these words is spoken too quickly, it's tough to tell the difference. This is likely how Swedes and eventually much of Europe came around to putting together waffles and the Feast of the Annunciation, which marks the day that the angel Gabriel came to Mary to deliver the light of the world, the son of God.

For centuries throughout Catholic Europe, the Feast of the Annunciation on March 25 was considered the start of the new year. Even Ancient Rome celebrated the new year at the spring equinox. But eventually the original Roman calendar, used for centuries, fell out of sync with real-time astronomical events. So, Julius Caesar instituted the Julian calendar to correct the original Roman calendar, setting January 1 as New Year's Day. This he did in honor of Janus, the Roman god who looked backward

and forward, into the past and into the future. Things continued on this way for many more centuries until the medieval Church, which saw things differently from Rome, moved New Year's Day back to March 25, in concert with Our Lady Day. As the centuries passed, flaws in the Julian Calendar became apparent. Easter was falling out of sync with spring, so

in 1582, Pope Gregory XIII introduced the Gregorian calendar, which reformed and corrected the Julian calendar and its many miscalculations. It is the calendar we use today and the most in-sync with the

sun. Pope Gregory also moved New Year's Day back to January 1st.

Time is a tricky thing. Catholics throughout Europe managed to continue celebrating Our Lady Day despite the arrangement of minutes, days, weeks, and months. When Sweden declared the Lutheran faith its national religion in 1593, the one Catholic feast that sustained according to all calendars was the Annunciation of our Lord. Thanks to this, and perhaps fast-talking Swedes, we can indulge, during Lent, in waffles.


