

any find struggle in Jesus. Some who L consider themselves faithful hail him in their churches but still struggle to figure out what to do with him on our streets. The message is somehow more palatable when it echoes pious renderings and sentiments and involves singing hosannas during worship. It becomes a bit trickier when it gets to the part about changing the way we conduct the business of our lives, becoming more sensitive to the disadvantaged, poor, and marginalized, and living as servants of our Loving Creator. Ultimately, it is a struggle between wanting to be God ourselves and letting God be God as God is. That's why it's so easy to become hypocritical. We, like those who hailed Christ as he arrived in Jerusalem and sent

Christ to the cross to die, also talk out of both sides of our mouths. We entertain what suits us at the time and walk away from the rest.

Many neglect God's beautiful creation because they prefer what humans have made instead. Progress isn't seen in preserving and enhancing what God has made but replacing it with something we believe is better and more useful. The earth, flowers, and animals are all expendable if they stand in the way of the "more" we want to achieve. We seek to remove as many obstacles and hurdles as possible in search of the easiest, quickest, and most efficient path we can find. Why endure insult or injury when we can

retaliate, eliminate or subdue? Why accept life when it is acceptable to choose otherwise? We must not resist accepting the fact that our real Creator has already given us the blueprints for the life we need to live in the Beatitudes and in the example of his Passion.

How would Jesus' journey have ended if he lived life as we do? Unless we encounter the good with the bad, the just with the unjust, the grace with the sin, the glory with the cross, the death with the life we most certainly risk rendering God obsolete.

A Call Away From Indifference

Elie Wiesel, Holocaust survivor and Nobel prize-winning peace activist, wrote that,

"The opposite of love is not hate, it's indifference. The opposite of art is not ugliness, it's indifference. The opposite of faith is not heresy, it's indifference. And the opposite of life is not death, it's indifference." Indifference, a lack of concern or a refusal to act

in the face of injustice, is at the heart of human suffering. With this in mind, <u>Saint Maximilian</u> Kolbe (who was executed by the Nazis on August 14, 1941, after having offered his own life to save a condemned Jewish prisoner) described indifference as "the most deadly poison of our times."

In most cases, our indifference is born of comfort or complacency and a sense that "I shouldn't get involved" or "it isn't my business." Sadly, we can alltoo-easily recognize how these attitudes allow injustice, abuse, and neglect to continue and increase in too many places in the world today.

However tempting it might be to pretend otherwise, there are things worth living for, suffering for, and even dying for. This is why the question of <u>Cuban poet José Marti</u> — "When others are weeping blood, what right do I have to weep tears?" — calls us to an even more essential question: "What is the value of a life that is lived without anything worth dying for?"

The inconvenience, discomfort, sadness, and pain we may feel if we open our hearts and pay attention to

what is happening in and to the world around us are the only real antidote to indifference, because those feelings should call us to action. Palm Sunday and Holy Week reveal for us a God who, in Jesus, was anything but indifferent: "He emptied himself, taking the form of a slave ... he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a

cross" (Philippians 2:7a, 8).

Although Palm Sunday's ability to confront and confound our indifference can be startling and even frightening, the real grace of this celebration is in the opportunity it provides for us to renew our commitment to life in Christ. The days of Holy

Week challenge us to envision a life in which—rather than simply limping along from "mistake" to "mistake" we take responsibility for our indifference, our self-preference, and our sins to become free to grow in love and our care about what we do to others, to creation, and to our own bodies, psyches, and souls.

In the end, living the mystery of the Cross leaves no room for indifference because, as <u>Saint Cyril of</u>

<u>Alexandria</u> observed, "Christ's example of courage in God's service will be of great profit for us, for only by putting the love of God before our earthly life and being prepared when occasion demands to fight zealously for the truth, can we attain the supreme blessing of perfect union with God" (*Commentary on John*, 12.19).

ALL MASSES ARE IN THE CHURCH:

HOLY THURSDAY - April 1 7 p.m. (Adoration following) GOOD FRIDAY - April 2 7 p.m. HOLY SATURDAY - April 3 8 p.m. Vigil EASTER DAY - April 4 8 a.m./ 9:30 a.m./ 11 a.m.

PLEASE NOTIFY FATHER as soon as possible if you cannot use your reserved seats for any of the four Easter Masses. (Mass reservations cannot be switched.)

A REMEMBRANCE BOOK for the names of deceased family and loved ones will be open for anyone to sign in the church vestibule on Good Friday from 8 a.m. until Mass at 7 p.m.

WASHING OF THE FEET will still be offered on Holy Thursday but those participating must bring their own towels and dry their own feet.

KISSING OF THE CROSS will not be permitted as part of the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord on Good Friday. Instead, we may adore the cross in the same manner as for the distribution for Holy Communion. Once there, worshipers may either genuflect or make a profound bow before the cross. Also, a container to hold single-stem flowers will be near the cross for those who would like to remember family or friends affected by Covid-19.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM:

By appointment. The diocese requires instructions beforehand for parents or guardians. Contact the parish office.

REGISTRATION, CHURCH SUPPORT:

Parishioners should be properly registered at the parish office. Please be sure to update your information when you move or change phone numbers.
