

GOSPEL MEDITATION: DO NO HARM

There are some who will say we have lost our Christian axis to a world of "anything goes" -- that we are losing touch with benchmarks meant to keep present in us a sense of both grace and sin. Acceptable ethical and moral behaviors are no longer understood or clear.

Jesus' display at the Temple teaches us about losing touch with moral and ethical benchmarks, especially as given to us in the Ten Commandments. We must be sure to see the Ten Commandments as practical and wise guideposts to effective living. We must be sure not to live on "relativism island," where it is only suggestion to "love and do no harm." While Jesus most certainly emphasized love above anything

else, the love of which Jesus spoke is more demanding and complex. It establishes an intimate connection with God, neighbor, self, and creation. Because this love, who is God Himself, is at the foundational core of our lives, it requires actions and attitudes that serve to build up, increase, and free up those relationships. Love requires proper conduct. Preserving and enhancing these love-centered relationships is at the heart of the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments can save the world from turmoil and conflict by instilling basic moral and relational principles within us. They also hold a healthy sense of sin in balance and always remind us of our relationship with God and ©LPi

the freedom God offers. Our faith preserves these jewels of truth that are too often looked beyond, dismissed altogether, or even removed from public view. Our Lenten journey, especially when embarked upon with sincerity and resolve, can restore all our essential relationships. When we get absorbed in life's preoccupations and demands, things can quickly get distorted, and we can find ourselves way off track. In short, we find ourselves in sin. We need only to look around us, at the glory of God's creation, to renew our connection to Him and to living that is solidly grounded in moral and ethical principles that keep us connected to God and to each other.

Making Sense of Suffering Through Stations of the Cross

How do Christians make sense of the crosses they bear? The question of why suffering exists finds its answer in Christ's

transformation of suffering through love. Christ's cross makes sense of our own, hence the universal appeal of devotions like the Stations of the Cross.

On his way to Calvary, Christ experienced the sufferings ordinary men and women experience every day throughout the world. He showed not only how to deal with them, but through the power of love how to transform suffering's destructive power into something that is life-giving.

Taking up his cross, Christ models how to accept suffering as an act of love in obedience to God's will. Christ falls three times on the way to Calvary. The sufferings due to sin in our lives continually cause failure. In falling himself, Christ shows that, despite suffering's tendency to bring us down, discouragement can be overcome by dependence on God's grace. Christ teaches us how to persevere through the failure and exhaustion through which our suffering inevitably leads and be of one heart and mind in pursuit of the Father's will. Such is redemptive suffering — as the familiar old saying goes, "no pain, no gain."

Seating is limited to 50 for each Mass, but we can accommodate a few more if individual worshipers who are close to each other sign up in pairs or groups. This allows us to use less space for distancing.
