

GOSPEL MEDITATION: FINDING THE BALANCE

Picture yourself in the scene of today's Gospel. Many of us can resonate with the response of these disciples - 'amazed,' and 'exceedingly astonished,' or from another perspective, shocked and perplexed – because they are our own responses today when Jesus teaches. The poverty that Jesus invites His followers into can run in opposition to the "selfmade man" perspective of the American culture. Cardinal Cantalamessa describes four aspects of this Evangelical Poverty: material poverty as a social phenomenon to be addressed (as in combating world hunger); material poverty as an evangelical position to be embraced (as in radical frugality and simplicity of life); spiritual poverty as an evil to be fought (as in deliverance ministry); and spiritual

poverty as an ideal to strive for (as in St. Therese of Lisieux). Evangelical poverty is the pursuit of a characteristic of the heart, a quality of our being that ennobles of the Holy Spirit in order to attain the the effort to attain it.

We find this quality beautifully exemplified in the life of St. Francis of Assisi. As his material needs decreased his capacity for enjoyment increased. It is written that the poorer Francis became, the less cramped was his soul. Jesus' invitation here is to embrace the upside down perspective of being his follower.

Somewhere in between destitution and opulence lies the balance for Jesus' invitation to Gospel poverty. The "nahuh, Jesus" response that so many of us have to these ideas is indicative of the

impossibility of being a follower of Jesus on our own power. That's why Jesus gives his followers grace and the empowerment lofty heights of virtue. We cannot do it on our own; our attachments to carnality, pleasures, and possessions, as well as the fickleness and frailty of our flawed character are indeed strong and difficult to surrender unless we are convinced that something greater is available and worth the sacrifice. But Jesus' offer of salvation and eternal life is available to all without hesitation or reserve ... how shall we respond today?

Places of Service

The SJI Sisters work in four of Zimbabwe's eight dioceses: Bulawayo, Gweru, Harare and Masvingo. Sisters are engaged in hospital work, education, social work, pastoral ministry, care for orphans, and care for mentally challenged

children. Sr. Agatha is among seven sisters in the United States--three in Charleston (Sacred Heart Parish), two in Clarksburg (Immaculate Conception), one in San Antonio. One sister in Charleston is DRE and does home visits for shut-ins and the hospitalized, another provides afterschool care for the elementary school, and the third works as a nurse at Charleston Area Medical Center. One sister at Immaculate Conception is DRE and runs the youth ministry, and the second sister does home visits to shut-ins and the hospitalized and is the sacristan of the parish. The sister in Texas teaches at a Catholic university.

Hostel for Care of Mentally Challenged Children

Twenty years ago, at the request of parents, the sisters built a hostel in Zimbabwe for mentally challenged boys and girls to give them a safe place to live during school terms. The sisters are in the process of having a solar power generation system installed there to replace its hydroelectric system, which has become unreliable because of persistent droughts.

The sisters constructed two housing units that accommodate five children

each. Two more are needed.

Antenatal Clinic

The sisters created and run a pregnancy management clinic in a deprived rural area where most women cannot afford hospital fees. Work is ongoing to properly equip the clinic so that it can meet the

requirements of Zimbabwe's Ministry of Health.

Primary and Secondary Schools

The Sisters intend to build an elementary and high school for children who walk long distances to attend school. For the children's convenience and safety, the schools will be built close to the communities where the children live.

Solar Project - Bethany House

Bethany House was built by the sisters 20 years ago as a place for annual retreats and formation seminars. Any sister who wants to spend some quiet time in prayer or simply to rest is welcome to come to this place and recharge. The sisters want Bethany House to run on solar power and are slowly assembling the needed equipment. So far, one wing of the house runs fully on solar power.

Gratitude for Support of SJI Projects

The SJI Sisters are very grateful for the support in cash and kind they receive from several parishes and individuals in the diocese of Wheeling-Charleston. Without this support they would not be able to get their projects to start and continue.
