GOSPEL MEDITATION: GOD'S PRESENCE IN ALL CREATION

For some reason, it is easier to genuflect in reverence to the presence of Christ in the tabernacle of a church, than to genuflect in reverence to the same presence of Christ in another person's soul. We wrongly believe that God divides himself, placing himself in one place in preference to another. It doesn't work that way. Love of God and love of neighbor are intimately and inseparably connected because the essence and of God's very presence is in all creation. God's presence is just as real in the one who is good, as in the one who is bad, and the one who is just, and the one who is unjust.

Our brains get in the way of truly contemplating the awesomeness of this truth. We like to separate things into boxes, the sheep from the goats and the deserving from the undeserving. But, with God there are no distinctions such as this. Our human classifications. subdivisions, and definitions hold no power or have any weight in God's eyes. Sadly, we relate to God and to each other as if they do.

We have the order of things wrong, but we are so set on preserving this order that we are afraid to do it any other way. Yet, it makes no sense in terms of our faith. It doesn't square

with any of the words found in Sacred Scripture or in any time-tested teaching of the church.

We have it all reversed. We know that we do because when Jesus speaks about such things and the words of the Old Testament prophets ring out again, we start to feel uncomfortable and anxious. What we do, directly or by omission, to one of the least of these little ones we do to God. It is quite possible that some of what we are doing personally, economically, politically, globally, and even religiously is doing more harm than good. Let's ponder that a bit. - ©LPi

GRATITUDE EUCHARIST RESTORES CONNECTIONS

Oct. 1st was a special day for shut-in parishioner Rachel Kerekes. It marks her return to Holy Communion and her place in our church's family, a family she has been away from for too long, she says. It's a family the Kerekes' joined in 1965 when they moved to Moundsville from McDonald, Pa. "I was involved in just about everything for years," says Rachel, who was most active with the school while her sons Rodney Jr., Randy, Rick, and Ronnie attended.

"I really missed the connection to Holy Communion," reflects Rachel in a recent note to the parish. "I now feel like I'm part of the Church Family again." Her gratefulness extends to Eucharistic Minister Linda Beck, who is providing for Rachel now that restrictions have eased. "Thank you for taking your time to visit with those of us that are not able to attend Mass," Rachel writes. "I enjoy chatting about the comings and goings of St. Francis."

Rachel's note explains that her disability and her husband's long illness from cancer kept them from attending Mass in recent years. The Eucharist was then faithfully brought to them until Quarantine took it away.

Her note is lovely, as notes go, but behind the brief message is a woman more intimately connected to the Eucharist than her written gratitude reveals. The Eucharist links her to her church family, but it also connects her to the spirit of her beloved husband Rodney, whom she calls Ro. Ro died late last year of cancer.

Rachel's Eucharist story is uplifting. She was drawn to the presence of Christ in the sacrament when she was young--without having been raised Catholic. Her explanation for it is simple, almost childlike—like most who are similarly blessed. "It just made sense, so I followed it," she says. Following It led her to Ro. Becoming Catholic to marry him, she says, was an easy thing to do. "He said to me 'we have a problem—you're not Catholic.' I told him 'trust me, there is no problem."

For 60 more years after that, Rachel and Ro kept the Eucharist at the center of their marriage. Losing the Eucharist, she says, was like losing a close friend. Rachel now takes Holy Communion for her and Ro. She believes Ro joins her still, assuring her he is waiting for her alongside the Holy Spirit.

There is still one more thing to know about Rachel. It can only be learned by spending time with her, which comes with witty, sentimental stories of her family while growing up, raising four boys on a shoestring, happenings in her children's lives now, and anecdotes of carefree banter with Ro. If you listen to her carefully, a theme emerges-Rachel treats people as the Eucharist teaches, with unconditional love. There is no one story that reveals this about Rachel. Rachel's stories are humble and self-aware. It emerges as her stories intertwine: Rachel finds the goodness in people and situations. "God loves us all," she says, "so we should not look down on anvone.' - Kathy Swift
